D 409: Bullet holes in a West Berlin apartment, 1965

At about five o'clock in the morning on January 4, 1965, a man, approximately 25 years old, succeeded in fleeing not far from Ruppiner Strasse. He had a wire cutter with him, as well as a rope ladder and a heaving line, when he entered the border area unnoticed. The border guards did not detect him until he set off the alarm on the signal fence. They opened fire, but the fugitive had taken cover behind a screen and was not hit. He managed to climb over the Wall to West Berlin unharmed. A number of bullets, however, flew into West Berlin territory. Some entered the bedroom of a resident who was

asleep in bed at the time.

On the evening of September 7. 1966, the border guard on Swinemünder Strasse noticed a man climbing over the inner fence at Schönholzer Strasse. His supervisor chased after the man and fired at him. The fugitive. Klaus N... took cover behind an anti-tank obstacle. The border soldiers assumed that he had been hit and wanted to arrest him, but he managed to climb over the inner wall unnoticed and escape back into East Berlin. An East German policeman who had watched the escape attempt from his apartment arrested Klaus N. on Brunnenstrasse.

Klaus-Peter K. was arrested by border troops on December 14, 1973. He had tried to flee to West Berlin from Brunnenstrasse. He was apprehended along the patrol road after having gotten past the inner wall and the signal



Renate L., a secretary for the East Berlin housing construction administration, was accompanied by an East Berlin police officer when she inspected the building at Bernauer Strasse 31. When she briefly found herself alone and unobserved in the backyard, she seized the moment. She fled through the front door that had not yet been sealed up and ran to West Berlin.

Ulla D. and Hans K. fled to the West on the evening of September 3, 1961. On June 19, 1962, West Berlin police heard three shots fired at Ruppiner Strasse, Shortly thereafter cries of pain were heard, presumably from a wounded fugitive.

Jürgen B. had already climbed over the wire fence when border guards arrested him on Ruppiner Strasse on the night leading into January 5, 1963. During guestioning, he admitted to wanting to flee to the West.

On the morning of September 8, 1961 the photographer of an East Berlin magazine took pictures of the Wall on Swinemünder Strasse. The border guards were checking his papers when a young man came out of a bakery located close to the Wall. He seized the moment and ran to the Wall, climbing over it without difficulty. The border guards noticed him too late to stop his escape.

D 423

Three young men were able to escape to the West at Ruppiner Strasse on the evening of August 17, 1961. Using a truck, they rammed through the recently erected wall. The border guards quickly opened fire, but the fleeing men were not injured. This was the fourth time since August 13 that shots were fired at fugitives in Berlin. The men were unharmed, but a number of bullets fired from machine pistols flew onto the West Berlin side - one went into a resident's bedroom.

Jan-Michael G. wanted to flee at

Ruppiner Strasse where gates in the inner wall and signal fence allowed border troops to pass through. Driving a heavy cargo truck on the evening of April 8, 1989, Jan-Michael G. broke through both gates. But the truck got entangled in a rope barrier that was especially designed to stop trucks. Jan-Michael G. was arrested and handed over to the secret police.

On the afternoon of March 29, 1962, Johannes M. offered the border guard at Ruppiner Strasse a thousand marks to let him and his girlfriend pass through to the West. The border soldier agreed, but instead he notified his comrade. When Johannes M. returned with Klara B., they were both arrested.

On the evening of May 24, 1973, Jürgen B. approached the gate of the inner wall at Ruppiner Strasse. He shook the gate and called out "let me across, you swine." He was arrested by border soldiers.

On the morning of October 3, 1962, 200 teenagers of a tour group were viewing the Berlin Wall. Six of them climbed onto the Wall at Swinemünder Strasse to take photographs. The border soldiers demanded that they get off the Wall. When they didn't obey, the border guards threw smoke grenades. The West Berlin police responded by firing several smoke grenades back at them. The situation settled down a short time later.



The border troops set up an observation post at Bernauer Strasse 44 to enable the guards to observe activity on Bernauer Strasse. On the evening of September 17, 1962, they noticed a man in front of the building at Bernauer Strasse 42. The border quards suspected an escape. The head guard sent for a flashlight so they could search the deserted building. Meanwhile a West Berlin policeman threatened the guard at the observation post with his drawn weapon. Other policemen were positioned in front of Bernauer Strasse 42, ready to shoot. They broke through a walled-up basement window and three young men climbed out. The fugitives were driven away quickly in a police car. The escape was already over when border soldiers arrived half an hour later.

1961, Mrs. K., 89 years old, was waiting for two people whom she didn't know, who were interested in renting her basement at Bernauer Strasse 44. Shortly before noon a man and a woman rang the doorbell. After they entered the apartment, they walked right over to the window, intending to flee. When Mrs. K. let out a cry of fear. the fugitives covered her mouth. Neighbors who had heard the scream notified the border guards. By the time they entered the apartment, the couple had already jumped out the window.

On the evening of October 6, 1961, border police arrested Anita L. and Erna M. in the attic of the building at Swinemünder Strasse 24. They had been planning to use a clothes line to climb down to the West. They were handed over to the East Berlin police.

On the evening of November 10 1983, border soldiers arrested Ronni S. in the border strip as he was trying to escape to West Berlin with the help of a stepladder.

On October 18, 1961, construction workers were monitored as they bricked up the windows of the building at Bernauer Strasse 44. The fiancé of the construction worker Norbert Raasch lived in the West. When nobody was looking, he seized the moment and jumped out the first-floor window onto the sidewalk on the west side. His supervisor had suspected that he was planning to flee, but chose not to report it to the border guards. The escape did not become known until the end of the workday when Raasch could not be found. The brigadier was brought to police headquarters at Alexanderplatz and interrogated the entire night. He was released the next morning and did not suffer any further sanctions.

friends Erich E., Gerd Sch. and W. in July 1962. At the time Jörg S. was serving duty in the army and posted at the Berlin Wall. This was supposed to assist them in their escape plan. On August 1, 1962, Jörg S. arranged to be assigned rear quard at the road barrier on Swinemünder Strasse. At about 9:15 p.m., Erich E. and W. entered the border area. After Jörg S. pretended to check their papers, they headed for the building at Swinemünder Strasse 23. A short time later, Jörg S. asked the head guard G. to come to the building where civilians had been found. When Private G. entered the back courtyard, one of fugitives

few days later.

On May 12, 1987, a person was arrested by border soldiers in the border strip at Swinemünder Strasse after he had climbed over the inner wall.

Erich B. lived with his wife, two children and his mother-in-law at Bernauer Strasse. Many thou-Swinemünder Strasse 23. After the Wall was built, the family decided to flee. On September 19, group "Arbeitsgemeinschaft 13. 1961 they jumped from the first floor of the building next door, Bernauer Strasse 42, into the rescue net of the West Berlin fire department, Erich B, broke his thigh bone during the fall and had to stay in the hospital for six months. The rest of the family survived the escape unharmed.

In the early evening of September 2, 1961, about 200 people gathered at Swinemunder Strasse and waved across the Wall to West Berlin. Several of the parents in the group lifted their children up in the air. The police patrol was unable to break up the crowd. The crowd was not dispersed until an intervention force arrived about half an hour later.

Just past five o'clock in the morning on September 19, 1961, four men and a woman slid down a rope that they had attached to the chimney on the roof of the building at Bernauer Strasse 43. They

On the afternoon of February 19, 1962, border troops discovered a hole in a bricked-up window on the first floor of the building at Bernauer Strasse 46. It is believed that by candlelight a man used nails to scratch away the plaster from the brick joints and then jumped through the hole to the West.

The military conscripts Udo S.

and Burckhardt B. were on duty at Eberswalder Strasse on March 23, 1966. They were both unhappy serving at the border. They decided to flee that afternoon. They broke through the door in the blocking screen at Eberswalder Strasse and moved beyond the other border guards' field of vision. To the right of the blocking screen, they climbed over the wall of the freight depot and jumped to the apartment of Bruno P. at Bernthe West. The escape was not detected until a West Berlin police border guards noticing. A short officer called over to the border guards: "So! Now there are two fewer of you!"

On the afternoon of September 12. 1961, an unknown man managed to escape to the West. He had broken into the first-floor apartment of the Sch. family in the building at Bernauer Strasse 47 and used a telephone cable to climb down from the window. On the evening of August 28. 1961, Dieter R. managed to enter

auer Strasse 47b without any time later he jumped to the West from the second-floor window. According to the border troop investigation, Bruno P. had escaped once before.

At least seven escape tunnels existed in exhibition area D. but only one of them was successful.

West Berlin students dug "Tunnel stopped working on a ten-meter 29" from factory ruins at Bernauer long tunnel they had begun from Strasse 78 to Schönholzer Strasse 7. During two nights in September 1962, 29 people were able to escape to West Berlin through this tunnel. A short time later, a few of these tunnel builders began digging a second escape tunnel from the same cellar rooms. But the tunnel was betrayed. When the tunnel builders broke through to the East in February 1963, secret police agents were waiting for them in the cellar of Brunnenstrasse 45. They recognized the threat in time. But fourteen people who were planning to escape and three couriers were arrested and sentenced.

Escape Tunnels

The tunnel builders who had 1963 after the escape plans were begun digging from the cellar of Bernauer Strasse 82 in August 1962 feared that this project had also been betrayed. The tunnel was already thirty meters long when they gave up on it at the end of the year. Eight years later another tunnel was begun at Bernauer Strasse 80. In May 1970. after receiving a tip and employ ing listening devices, the East German secret police began digging a trench that intersected and exposed the 85-meter-long escape tunnel.
